It is wrong to let the water users in the upper Schofield and upper Huntington Canyon areas suffer losses because of the State's lack of regulation of the misuse of the water resources by one company. When we are in a dry period, as we are now, it is unconscionable to allow one company such as the Eccles Canyon Mine to misuse the water resource, drawing the aquifer down to unacceptably low levels. Who knows when the water conditions will replenish this aquifer if we do not take steps now to conserve it?

Please accept my complaint and notify me as to what must be done to rectify this problem.
