Dear Mr. Bell:

This letter is to document your commitments made to Brian and myself at the mine site on July 29th 1977. If you are in agreement with the following conditions and timetable for performance, please inform this office of same by written communication as soon as possible so we can recommend approval of your Federal lease to the Governor.

1. New culverts or bridges will be installed over Cottonwood Creek and the old overpasses will be removed. The final design choice will be left to you, but the new facilities will be constructed of quality materials so as to be of adequate size and strength to pass a flow of 450 cfs or the estimated 50 year storm.
2. Overland flow of water from the mine workings, work pad, reject piles and coal loading areas will be contained by a permanent earth/rock embankment along the entire length of the pad and will be diverted into an adequate settling pond for clarification or evaporation.
3. Drainage from the canyon immediately west of the main building will be directed across the work area in an adequately sized and maintained channel. This diversion will be constructed so as to transport runoff from this canyon directly into Cottonwood Creek with minimal erosion or washing of the pad.
4. The above measures will be installed by February 1, 1978. Any extension of this deadline will be a matter of a public hearing before the Board.

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In addition to the above, your reclamation plan will need to be augmented by a map of the surface facilities. The scale should be such so that all permanent facilities are clearly evident. This requirement does not follow the above time deadline, but should be submitted when you have definite long range plans finalized. In the meantime, your operation can continue according to 40-8-23 paragraph (1) of the Utah Mined Land Reclamation Act.
