


Dear Mr. Lauriski:

During the last few months the Castle Valley Special Service District and Huntington City have been examining the impacts that the planned Mill Fork Tract Lease (LBA11) might have on our Little Bear Spring. We are greatly concerned with this spring because it is the major source of water for the communities of Huntington, Cleveland and Elmo.

The main focus of our investigation has been the recharge area and flow patterns into the Little Bear Spring. Numerous theories have been presented by various hydrologic consultants. At this point we are not sure which theory is correct. However, one of the main ideas presented is that the flow is originating from a Southerly direction in Mill Fork Canyon, Rilda Canyon, and maybe even as far south as the Cottonwood Canyon area. The water is entering the ground then following faults and fractures associated with the Mill Fork Graben until it reaches the Little Bear Spring. We believe that this is a likely possibility for the recharge of the spring.

If this theory is correct, then we have a very major concern with Energy West's mining operations in their present leases #U-06039 and U-024317. These leases cover the Mill Fork Graben area with its numerous faults and fractures. Mining operations in this area could possibly interrupt or interfere with the water quality and quantity in our Little Bear Spring.

Any interruption or interference with the flow to this spring would be extremely serious for us and the 2,600 people who depend on it for drinking water.


