**INVITATION TO BID**

The City of Ferron is accepting bids for the construction of a new Fire Station at 90 East Molen Road, Ferron, UT. This facility is approximately 6355 square feet in area. The structure is pre-manufactured steel frame construction with masonry exterior walls and both metal and single ply roofing. Bid packets and drawings may be obtained from the office of ARCHOS Design located at 271 North Main St., Spanish Fork, UT (phone: 801-794-3355), during normal working hours starting Monday, December 9, 2003. Bid packages will require a \$250 deposit, refundable upon submittal of a valid bid and return of the documents. Bids must conform to all requirements listed in the bid packet.

Bids are due at the Ferron City Office, Ferron, Utah 84523 no later than Friday, December 19, 2003 at 2:00 P.M., at which time they will be publicly opened and read. The bid may be awarded to the most responsive and responsible bidder within 30 days of the bid opening. The project is funded through the USDA Rural Development and all requirements of the USDA RD program, as outlined in these documents, including the Davis Bacon Act, shall be met by the successful Contractor.

of Utah Health Sciences Center ("UUHSC"), will rename its rehabilitation center as "The University of Utah Rehabilitation Center and Miners Hospital." The new hospital will provide medical services to Disabled Miners (defined as certain Utah residents who have worked in a Utah mine for at least two years, or who suffered acute trauma while working in a Utah mine) for mine-related injuries and illnesses. If the Disabled Miner has no insurance, or other medical care coverage, the service will be provided free of charge. If the miner has insurance, he will assist the University in pursuing reimbursement from his insurers. The Miners Hospital will provide a significant array of medical services to Disabled Miners, including treatment for common mine-related injuries and illnesses such as black lung (pneumoconiosis) and silicosis, and care in many medical fields, including but not limited to pulmonology, occupational medicine, internal medicine, orthopedics and oncology. The Miners Hospital will also provide community outreach services to Disabled Miners, and will set up a clinic, either in Price or Provo/Orem, to attend to the medical needs of Disabled Miners. The Miners Hospital will have a dedicated Director (initially Dr. Phillip Bryant) and Assistant Director, and the Disabled Miners' care will be managed by UUHSC case managers.

Notably, in the litigation, the plaintiffs originally requested that the Court order the State to build a stand alone hospital. The parties all agree, however, that it will be far superior to have the Miners Hospital, as a part of the UUHSC because the Disabled Miners will be able to take advantage of the wide array of medical services available at the UUHSC.

In addition to the creation of a hospital for Disabled Miners, the proposed settlement also provides the following benefits: i) any Miner will be entitled to two free yearly screenings at the Miners Hospital; ii) the UUHSC will put on yearly
