Oakley Adopts Master Plan

The town of Oakley announced the adoption of a Master Plan which was voted and accepted unanimously by the mayor and town council at its meeting January 22nd. The plan was developed by the engineering firm of John Call Engineering Company, Bountiful, Utah. Mr. Call has done many engineering projects for Oakley and was well qualified to undertake the project.

The Master Plan resulted from the accumulation of data over a 6 month period regarding the infrastructure of the town and their capability of providing for support of a potential projected population of 1250 residents by year 2005. In addition, a questionnaire was sent to the residents asking many questions as to their wishes regarding town services, recreation facilities, new businesses, as well as inviting comments relating to the town government. A better than average response was received with a little over 30% returned.

With that information and the analysis of it, a Master Plan was developed that provides a blueprint for Oakley development which will protect its small town atmosphere from the potential 'urban sprawl' inherent with increased visibility by out of town visitors.

Though Master Plans are only guides, they provide the basis for attracting funding through low interest loans and matching grants from the state and federal government for community projects, such as, road improvement, sidewalks in high risk areas, parks and recreation facilities, etc., all of which were covered in the adopted plan.

Other recommendations included equal and strict adherence to zoning ordinances, additional zoning and changes, annexation possibilities, and a town beautification program.

The town council is in the process of prioritizing many of the recommendations. A copy of the Master Plan is on file at the clerk's office and anyone interested can check it out for a brief time to read it. An agenda for the town meetings will be posted and published a week before the meetings so residents may attend those meetings of interest to them.

Planning ahead is important in any undertaking. And of equal importance is working that plan. The council and mayor intend to do just that, they said.

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
